Budget Snapshot: K-12 Education Funding in Appropriations Committee's Budget for FYs 2026-27

April 23, 2025

On April 22, 2025, the Connecticut General Assembly's Appropriations Committee introduced and passed its recommended biennial budget for fiscal years 2026 and 2027. Included in the budget are policy changes and proposed appropriations to fund K-12 public education that impact students and districts throughout the state.

The following analysis outlines the changes to state education funding in the Appropriations Committee's budget, and provides a brief overview of the general outlook of the state budget and economy.

The Appropriations Committee's biennial budget is based on an economic forecast that assumes Connecticut's economy will continue to grow in FYs 2026 and 2027, though at a slower rate when compared to recent fiscal years.² However, the April 30th consensus revenue estimates may include modified projections for FYs 2026 and 2027 due to recent pressures on financial markets and uncertainty regarding tariffs and international trade, which may require adjustments to the state budget.³

The Appropriations Committee's budget continues the budget development process that started with the governor's proposed budget.⁴

- The Appropriations Committee reviewed the governor's budget proposal that was released in February.
- The Appropriations Committee's budget is utilized when the General Assembly negotiates a budget with the governor.
- The negotiated budget will be put to a vote by each chamber of the legislature.
- Once each chamber passes the same exact version of the budget, the budget will be sent to the governor, who will sign it into law, veto it, veto specific line items, or let it go into effect without signing.

Key Policies in the Appropriations Committee's Budget

• Education Cost Sharing (ECS) grant would continue to be phased in. ECS funding would continue to follow the current phase-in schedule according to statute, resulting in the full funding of ECS grants in FY 2026 and beyond for towns considered "underfunded" according to the ECS formula.

² The Economic Report of the Governor, released with the governor's proposed biennial budget, projects a slower increase in Connecticut's gross state product (GSP) in FYs 2026 (1.0%) and 2027 (1.1%) compared to FY 2025 (1.6% projected), and a higher personal income growth for FY 2026 (5.1%) compared to FY 2025 (4.7% projected), before slowing down in FY 2027 (4.5%).

- Appropriations Committee's budget would continue to pause the ECS formula's phase-out schedule. This would hold towns considered "overfunded," according to the ECS formula, harmless at their FY 2025 grant amounts for FYs 2026 and 2027.
- Excess Cost grant funding would be significantly increased. The proposed budget would increase the Excess Cost grant by an additional \$124 million in FY 2026 and FY 2027. This is in contrast to the governor's proposed budget, which would only increase the Excess Cost grant by \$40 million in FY 2027.
- <u>ECS-based</u>, student-centered funding system would remain partially phased in for magnet schools and AgriScience programs.
 - For FY 2026 and onwards, operators would receive per student their FY 2024 per-student grant plus 42 percent of the difference between their full weighted student funding amount and their FY 2024 per-student grant.
 - Operators would also continue to be held harmless at their FY 2024 state aid plus tuition per student.
- Specific support would be provided to EASTCONN and EdAdvance. Under the
 Appropriations Committee's budget, EASTCONN, a Regional Educational Service
 Center (RESC), would receive an additional \$3 million in one-time aid in FY 2027,
 while another RESC, EdAdvance, would receive a grant of \$900,000 in both FY
 2026 and FY 2027.
- <u>Tuition would remain capped for magnet and AgriScience program operators.</u> For FY 2026 and onwards, general education tuition amounts that operators may charge sending districts would remain capped at 58 percent of the per-student tuition amount the operator charged in FY 2024.
- Partial need-based funding for state charter schools would continue and two new charter schools would be funded. State charter schools would continue to receive 56.7% of their full weighted funding amount per student with no policy changes proposed.
 - An additional \$2.5 million would be appropriated in FY 2026 and FY 2027 to open two new charter schools: Stamford Big Picture Learning Academy and Taino Co-LAB New Haven.
- High-Quality Special Education Incentive grant would be established. Both the
 Appropriations Committee's budget and the governor's proposed budget
 allocate \$10 million, with \$100,000 specifically designated for personal services, to
 create an incentive program that enables school districts to develop or expand
 in-district or multi-district special education programs aimed at reducing student
 outplacements.
- State's compliance with the Sheff v. O'Neill settlement would be maintained. The Appropriations Committee's budget, much like the governor's budget proposal, would provide adjustments to maintain the State's compliance with the Sheff v. O'Neill settlement.

- o This includes the *Sheff* Transportation Grant, grants for specialized programming, and marketing-related costs.
- Funding would be increased for some student support programs. The Appropriations Committee's budget increases funding for student support programs while maintaining the separation of these programs. This is in contrast to the governor's budget proposal, which consolidated these programs into a new competitive Student Support Services Grant and cut the aggregated funding amount by \$1.9 million.
- School meals programs would be expanded. The Appropriations Committee's budget would increase funding by an additional \$700,000 in both fiscal years to provide free meals to students who qualify for reduced-price meals. In contrast, the governor's proposed budget would provide the same amount of funding in FY 2026, but increase funding by approximately \$13.1 million in FY 2027 to provide universal free breakfast in addition to providing free lunch for students who qualify for reduced-price meals.

How would these policy changes impact students and schools?

- Much like the governor's proposed budget, the Appropriations Committee's budget largely maintains the school funding policy environment currently in law, with significant targeted investments for students with disabilities.
- Students in all towns would benefit from increased funding as a result of the completion of the ECS grant's phase-in schedule, and the inclusion of a holdharmless for "overfunded" towns.
- Districts would be better positioned to serve students with disabilities with the sizable investment in Excess Cost reimbursements and funds for districts to establish or expand high-quality in-district programs.
- However, the additional investments proposed in the Appropriations Committee's budget may not be possible or may require cutbacks in other budgetary areas, as the Committee's budget is estimated to exceed the state's spending cap by over \$200 million dollars in FY 2026. The legislature could legally exceed the spending cap if the governor declares an emergency or the existence of extraordinary circumstances, and at least three-fifths of the members in each legislative chamber approve exceeding the cap.

Analysis of Selected Appropriations

Table 1 on the following page contains the Appropriations Committee's FY 2026 and FY 2027 recommended appropriations for significant education grants. Table 1 also contains FY 2025 estimates and funding from the governor's budget proposal for comparative purposes. The appropriations included in Table 1 are education grants to municipalities and school districts in which the total estimated expenditures exceeded \$10 million in FY 2025. State funding for school choice programs is also included in the table.⁵

State education appropriations that would increase — <u>as compared to FY 2025 estimated expenditures</u> — under each budget proposal are highlighted in green, while those appropriations that would remain at FY 2025 estimated amounts are highlighted in yellow. Appropriations that would decrease compared to current FY 2025 estimated amounts are highlighted in red. The far-right column of Table 1 features the key policy details contained in the Appropriations Committee's budget for each grant.

Analysis of Education Cost Sharing (ECS) Grant

To distribute state education aid to towns for their local or regional public school districts, Connecticut uses the ECS formula, which was adopted in 2017 as part of the state budget, and first used and implemented in FY 2019.

Under the Appropriations Committee's proposed budget, ECS funding would increase to continue the statutory phase-in of funding to towns considered "underfunded" according to the ECS formula. The Committee's budget would hold towns considered "overfunded" harmless by maintaining their ECS grants at their FY 2025 levels instead of gradually decreasing their grant amounts. It is projected to require an additional \$8.7 million in FY 2026 and \$17.5 million in FY 2027 to hold "overfunded" towns harmless over the biennium. In total, the Appropriations Committee's budget provides approximately \$93.8 million more in ECS funding in FYs 2026 and 2027 over the estimated FY 2025 ECS funding levels. The Appropriation Committee's budget also includes minor changes to the ECS formula for the calculation of ECS grants to the Town of Mansfield.¹⁰

Table 2 on the following page compares, town by town, the <u>estimated ECS grants</u> for FYs 2026 and 2027 under the Appropriations Committee's budget and Governor Lamont's budget proposal — with a comparison to estimated FY 2025 ECS grant amounts. Towns projected to receive an increase in ECS funding in FYs 2026 and 2027 — <u>over their FY 2025 ECS grant amount</u> — are highlighted in green, while towns projected to receive a decrease in funding are highlighted in red. Towns projected to receive the same amount of ECS funding are highlighted in yellow.

Please note that adjustments in ECS funding levels — both at the town level and overall — in the Appropriations Committee's and governor's proposed budgets are the result of the ECS formula annually accounting for changes in enrollment, student needs, and community wealth.
