Comparison of K-12 Education Funding in Federal Spending Proposals for FY 2026

September 23, 2025

The federal budget process for fiscal year 2026 is underway with three proposals currently under consideration: President Donald Trump's budget request, the Senate Appropriations Committee's bill, and the House Appropriations Committee's bill. This document summarizes the key similarities and differences among the three proposals and provides a side-by-side comparison of selected education programs.

Lawmakers have until September 30th to reconcile the three proposals. If Congress is unable to reconcile the proposals or pass a continuing resolution that maintains current funding levels, a government shutdown will occur.

Key Takeaways

- Both President Trump's budget and the House Appropriations Committee's bill eliminate several grant programs, while the Senate Appropriations Committee's bill largely maintains current funding levels.
- The proposals from President Trump and the Senate Appropriations Committee maintain Title I-A funding, whereas the House Appropriations Committee's bill proposes a \$3.6 billion cut.
- The president's budget includes multiple program consolidations, some of which reduce spending, while neither the Senate Appropriations Committee's bill nor the House Appropriations Committee's bills include those consolidations.
- All three proposals generally maintain funding for special education programs, although President Trump's proposal consolidates IDEA funding streams.

Table 1 below provides a high-level comparison of key provisions across all three proposals. While Table 2, beginning on page 3, presents the FY 2024 final appropriation amount for select educational programs alongside the budget proposals from President Trump, the Senate Appropriations Committee, and the House Appropriations Committee. For reference, the FY 2024 grant allocations to Connecticut are provided in the rightmost column. All dollar amounts are rounded to the nearest million.
