K-12 Education Funding Policy Changes Passed During the November 2025 Special Session

November 14, 2025

On November 12, 2025, the Connecticut General Assembly convened a special legislative session to consider four pieces of legislation related to healthcare, housing affordability and growth, immigration enforcement, and fiscal adjustments in response to reductions in federal funding. While not one of the primary focuses of the special session, several policy changes to K-12 public school funding were included in special session legislation that impact students, schools, and communities.

A special session is a temporary convening of the Connecticut General Assembly to consider urgent or time-sensitive legislation.

- On November 7, 2025, Governor Ned Lamont called the legislature to meet in special session to address specific topics.
- Bills are introduced, reviewed, and debated in both chambers of the General Assembly.
- After its passage in both chambers, a bill is sent to the governor, who will sign it into law, veto it, veto specific line items (if applicable), or let it go into effect without signing.

K-12 Education Policies Enacted During the Special Session

- School districts in municipalities that meet certain housing and planning requirements will be eligible for higher reimbursement rates for school construction projects.²
 - Local and regional boards of education, as well as endowed academies, in eligible municipalities will receive a 5-percentage point increase in their school construction reimbursement rate starting in 2026.
 - To qualify, a municipality must meet at least one of the following conditions:
 - 1. Comply with the housing growth planning requirements in H.B. 8002 (November 2025 Special Session) and demonstrate steps taken to implement its housing growth policies;
 - 2. Be designated a transit-oriented community (as defined in H.B. 8002) by adopting zoning regulations creating a transit-oriented district around transit stations; or
 - 3. Establish a development district with the Connecticut Municipal Development Authority.

- The Open Choice Voucher pilot program is re-established to expand access to eligible families participating in the Open Choice program.³
 - The program will provide 20 Rental Assistance Program (RAP) certificates over a two-year period (10 vouchers each for the 2026-27 and 2027-28 school years) to families who qualify as low-income under the RAP, have participated in the Open Choice program for at least one year, and would like to move to the town where their child is attending a school through the Open Choice program.
 - The pilot program previously applied only to families in the Hartford region but will now be available to any family with a student participating in the Open Choice program.
- To address the impact of reduced federal funding, \$500 million from the state's Budget Reserve Fund is appropriated to maintain essential programs and services, including school meals.⁴
 - Funding will be used to respond to, and mitigate, actions by the federal government resulting in reduced funding for the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC); the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP); the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP); healthcare; school meals; childcare assistance; or housing assistance.
 - There are no details within the legislation clarifying how much funding will be allocated to each program.
