## Student-Centered Funding Proposal

## **KEY COMPONENTS**

- Protects \$150 million investment in K-12 education for FY 2025
- Fully funds Education Cost Sharing (ECS) grants, effective FY 2026
- Expands ECS weighted funding to students attending public schools of choice (magnet schools, charter schools, AgriScience programs, and the Open Choice program) while protecting funding for local public schools
- Saves districts tens of millions of dollars by phasing out general education tuition billing for magnet school operators and AgriScience programs

## WHY CONNECTICUT NEEDS STUDENT-CENTERED FUNDING NOW

- Helps Bridge the "Fiscal Cliff": Federal COVID-relief dollars will soon expire, but the pandemic's impacts on student learning and mental health will last long after these funds are gone.
  - Greater state support is critical to ensuring students have access to the teachers, tutors, programming, and resources they need to be successful in the classroom and beyond.
- Responds to Crisis of Growing Student Needs: The learning needs of Connecticut's students continue to grow significantly and necessitate greater funding. In the past year, the number of students considered low-income has increased by over 8,000 and the number of multilingual learners has grown by over 10% (4,500 students).
  - Students also continue to experience increased mental health challenges and high levels of distress after the pandemic. More mental health supports and school resources are needed to help students facing these hurdles.
- Reduces Economic & Racial Funding Disparities: Significantly cuts the \$550 million racial gap in Connecticut education funding, which continues to limit opportunities for economically-disadvantaged students and students of color.
- <u>Invests in Connecticut's Future:</u> Makes historic investment in education funding, which **research** has repeatedly shown improves student outcomes, including:
  - o Higher test scores, graduation rates, and academic achievement;
  - o Higher earnings for life; and
  - o Reductions in adult poverty.
